



The Battle of Bita Paka – 11 September 1914

During the late 1800s and early 1900s the Germans established a network of powerful wireless and telegraph stations in the south-west Pacific. These stations enabled them to communicate quickly with Germany and with German ships in the region. When Britain declared war on Germany, Australia was asked to destroy the radio stations and to occupy German New Guinea and the surrounding areas.

A special force was to be raised for this task. Recruiting for the Australian

Naval and Military Expeditionary Force (ANMEF) began on 10 August 1914. Less than ten days later Colonel William Holmes DSO had recruited, equipped, and embarked a 1,000-strong infantry battalion and 500 naval reservists and ex-seamen. The naval reservists were drawn from Queensland, New South Wales, Victoria, and South Australia.

As well as the infantry battalion and naval brigade, the force included two machine-gun sections, a signals section, and a medical section. An additional militia battalion from north Queensland was to join the force at Port Moresby. The ANMEF left Sydney on 19 August aboard HMAT *Berrima* escorted by HMAS *Sydney*.

While the ANMEF was training at Palm Island, near Townsville, *Berrima* was joined by the stores ship Aorangi an HMAS *Encounter*.

Submarines AE1 and AE2 joined the convoy on the way to Port Moresby, where it was met by HMAS Warrego and Yarra and the requisitioned liner Kanowna (which was sent home shortly afterward following an on-board mutiny by the ship's stokers and did not take part in any action). The convoy rendezvoused with HMAS Australia at Rossel Island before continuing on to Rabaul.

On 11 September 1914, shore parties landed unopposed at Rabaul and nearby Kabakaul, where a patrol of 25 Australian naval reservists pushed inland to the wireless station at Bita Paka. There they were engaged by a composite force of German reservists and Melanesian police.

As a result of the action, six Australians from the ANMEF were killed or died of wounds, and another four were wounded. One German was killed and one wounded. New Guinea troops suffered 41 casualties, with 30 killed and 11 wounded. RAN Reserve Officer Lieutenant Bond was awarded a Distinguished Service Order for his action in disarming eight Germans and causing the surrender of 20 New Guineans.

It was at this battle that the first Australian casualty of World War 1

occurred, that of Able Seaman Billy Williams, a sailor from Northcote, Melbourne. An enemy sniper fired at him from a tree top, hitting him in the stomach and fatally wounding him, the first of more than 60,000 Australians killed in World War I. Tragically, he had nearly completed his five years as a reservist and only had a week to go when war was declared.

The Australian Government has today handed over the newest Guardian-class Patrol Boat Nafanua II to the Samoan Government.

A UK-led joint staff of Royal Navy and French Marine Nationale assumed command of the Bahrain-based Combined Task Force (CTF) 150 from the Pakistan Navy.

The Minister for Veterans and Defence Personnel Darren Chester today launched the fourth Defence Reconciliation Action Plan.

Defence Minister Linda Reynolds has reinforced Australia's position as an Indian Ocean power during a speech at the Indo-Pacific Conference.

Western Australian Premier Mark
McGowan and Minister for Defence
Issues Paul Papalia have responded to
two studies into the Collins Class
submarine full-cycle docking
maintenance program, which have
found significant strategic and economic
benefits of moving this work to Western
Australia.

The Royal Navy has discharged three submariners after they failed a compulsory drug test. The submariners are understood to have served aboard Vanguard-class submarine HMS Vengeance.

A wargame publisher has been hired to help explore ways the Royal Navy and other UK armed forces services could use games for educational purposes. UK's Defence Science and Technology Laboratory (Dstl) has awarded gaming company Slitherine a two-year contract worth up to £1.5 million to demonstrate the potential of games to enhance training.

Australia's Two Ocean policy, established in the late 1980s, marked a major shift in the naval force posture of the Royal Australian Navy as it shifted away from the last vestiges of power projection in the region toward continental defence in the sea-air gap. However, the rapidly evolving balance of regional power raises an important question about the validity of a three-decade-old policy.

The Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) wants its dental and allied health service arrangements to continue meeting the needs of veterans and their families. For this reason, DVA is making changes to strengthen the quality of allied health care.
